



Pupil Premium Report - September 2016

Ecton Village Primary Academy receives Pupil Premium funding for each child that is currently registered to receive Free School Meals, and for any child that has been registered to receive Free School Meals within the last six years (known as Ever6 children).

We are required to report on how the pupil premium has been spent, and the impact it has had for the last two academic years. The data presented here relates to the Academy prior to conversion.

Academic Year 15/16

Pupil numbers increased overall by 20% during the course of the academic year. By the end of the academic year, 30% of our pupils were eligible for pupil premium funding. However, of those children, a quarter joined the school during the school year, entering year groups throughout the school. Therefore, not all will have received the extra provision detailed below for the full year, and not all started in time for their funding to follow from their previous school.

We were allocated £23,760 of Pupil Premium in the academic year 2015/16. This was used for:

Provision	Impact
1:1 and small group teaching for groups including pupil premium children. Programmes delivered included ReadWrite Inc., FreshStart and Kinetic Letters. All staff involved in the delivery of these programmes received relevant training. Resources were purchased to enable the delivery of these programmes.	Progress in English was broadly even when compared to non-pupil premium children. 50% made expected or better progress. Attainment was slightly lower than non-pupil premium children, being a percentile rank 12% lower.
Purchase of maths resources – e.g. Numicon packs, and delivery of maths lessons in small groups.	Progress in maths was the same as non-pupil premium children. 57% made expected or better progress during the last year. However, attainment in maths was 20 percentile ranks lower than non-pupil premium children.
Subsidised residential and day trips (50% reduction). Trips included a safari park, National Space Centre, and theatre trips to	All children attended all trips, including a residential for Years 5 & 6. Several of our pupil premium children have never had

Subsidised school clubs (multi-sports, football and gymnastics)	30% of pupil premium children attended a sports club during the year.
Counselling services were provided for emotional support for one pupil.	The pupil gained confidence from being able to discuss some issues.
Free milk is offered to all pupil premium children – their families sign up if they wish their children to partake. Contribution towards free school meals.	64% of pupil premium children choose to have free milk. 70% of children currently eligible for free school meals have a daily hot dinner.

The focus for 16/17 is to close the attainment gaps in English and Maths.

Looked-After Children Pupil Premium

No funding was received in respect of Looked-After-Children in the Year 15/16

Academic Year 14/15

We were allocated £20,517 of Pupil Premium in the academic year 2014/15. This was used for:

- *Targeted reading and support through 1:1 teaching assistant support;*
- *Provision of free school meals;*
- *School trip subsidies;*
- *School club subsidies;*
- *Purchase of a new reading scheme;*
- *Purchase of new handwriting software;*
- *Counselling services; and*
- *Provision of free school milk.*

Impact

Although pupil premium children made progress comparable with their non-pupil premium peers, their attainment was slightly below the school average. The difference is small in English (reading and writing), and this reflects the investment of the pupil premium in these areas in recent years. However, the gap in maths is slightly larger, and this is the area that will be focussed upon for those children in the coming year.
